One Health demands multiprofessional attention and efforts to advance research, training, and practice. Many of the critical issues in this area are cross-disciplinary in nature, have been discussed conceptually but remain short of a unified conceptual viewpoint, and neglect practical implementation bottlenecks, such as workforce issues. Workforce issues tend to focus on medical and veterinary staff, neglecting other workforce categories.

This Special Issue calls for papers that go beyond narrow conceptual approaches and professional understandings and requests contributors to examine important workforce issues through the broad lens of One Health. Diverse forms of articles (conceptual, empirical, critical commentary, etc.) and methodologies are welcome. With such a premise, recommended topics may include but are not limited to the following:

- One Health workforce planning;
- One Health workforce financing;
- One Health workforce education and training;
- One Health workforce tools;
- Service provision by a One Health workforce;
- One Health workforce labor market;
- One Health workforce capacity building;
- Country case studies on One Health workforce development;
- One Health workforce responses to pandemic threats.

It is great to see One Health being looked at by healthcare educators and INHWE will continue to drive impactful changes to policy, research and education in this field. Stay tuned for an upcoming INHWE Meets on this topic!
