DigitalHealthEurope Digest #4

Dear digital health enthusiast,

The fourth edition of the <u>DigitalHealthEurope</u> (DHE) Digest features the roundtable meetings which were conducted in December 2020 and March 2021. These meetings focused on **legal and interoperability** challenges of health data use and on cloud



technology. In each workshop, experts were invited to share their expertise to discuss the issue at stake. This digest issue informs you about the roundtables, their topics and aims, and highlights the key strands of discussion.

What are the DHE roundtables?

The roundtables are workshops dedicated to the **three topics** of (1) legal challenges in using health data, (2) health data standards and interoperability and (3) cloud technology in health data. Two workshops each were conducted on legal challenges and interoperability, and one workshop focused on cloud technology. Each workshop was attended by experts from related fields to discuss the issue at hand, map the scene, identify crucial points and think about innovative measures to tackle the identified challenges. Out of the three issues

discussed in the roundtables, well-formulated and concise **recommendations** are being distilled. They relate to the European Commission's 2018 <u>Communication on the Digital Transformation of Health and Care in the Digital Single Market</u>. At the end of the DHE project, they will be presented to the European Commission.

Sneak peek

Roundtable on legal challenges in using health data

A central question during the roundtable sessions was how any European law can be made into **an enabler** instead of there being many different guidelines and different interpretations on precisely the same norm. Another overarching topic of the roundtables was that legal norms should not only focus on data protection but rather on **citizen protection**. The experts pointed to a current human resources deficit around data protection and recommended that the challenge be tackled through more education being available for everyone who is handling data. Finally, experts discussed the **governance process**. They highlighted two points: the importance of the active engagement of citizens, and the use of plain language, so as to facilitate engagement and guarantee a better understanding of (legal, regulatory, and ethical) norms.

Roundtable on health data standards and interoperability

These roundtable sessions focused on the **demand side of interoperability**. Experts identified two key issues: citizens as change agents, and the need to move from data for patients towards tools for their health data management. Incentivising interoperable data and creating responsible data were identified as central points of the ongoing discussion around health data standards and interoperability. In this regard, **standards adoption** was

analysed with an important step in mind: support for the transformation of healthcare data ecosystem(s) towards an authentic real-world data ecosystem.

Roundtable on cloud technology in health data

Work has been done by DHE on **mapping data-sharing initiatives and cloud technology** projects funded under Horizon 2020. As a result, the discussion during this roundtable focussed on three main points: leveraging promising initiatives; outlining the basic conditions and purposes of cloud use; ensuring security and privacy in the use of cloud technology in health. A key insight was the need to distinguish between **different types of requirements**: the needs for infrastructure and requirements for applications run on the cloud. From the discussion, it became clear that many of these topics point to challenges that go beyond cloud technology, such as **terminology management**.

Output

During the roundtables, many concrete ideas were summarised and added to the many information and suggestions stemming from two years of activities within DigitalHealthEurope. On that basis, preliminary recommended actions for responsible and safe health data sharing and use are currently being elaborated.

In principle three types of actions were identified:

- ▶ Large implementation pilots and projects supporting regional and national early adopters to collaborate across borders to develop best practices, lessons learned and accelerate the reuse of data involving mature and high priority use cases.
- ► Research and Innovation projects.
- Co-ordination and Support Actions.

eHealth Stakeholder Group webinar

Stakeholder viewpoints are key. To gather stakeholder-specific input on the draft recommended actions for responsible and safe health data sharing and use, a webinar for the eHealth Stakeholder Group (eHSG) 2019-2022 member organisations was conducted on 28th May 2021. The webinar focussed on contextualising the preliminary recommended actions in light of the eHSG members' experiences and perceived challenges. Special attention was paid to the proposed legislation for the **European Health Data Space** (EHDS).

The webinar was highly interactive. It involved the participating stakeholders in both group and plenary discussions to reflect on the kind of actions that need to be taken in the future. They included European Union (EU) policy, regulatory action or support at three specific levels (EU, national, or through stakeholders).

A special focus was discussion of **priority use cases** for the EHDS. The aim was to identify existing gaps in implementation and state the content of a potential strategy to produce and deliver tangible benefits to citizens and society.
